Committees in the 118th Congress: A Centralina Perspective

Thousands of bills are introduced in Congress each year. However, only a few hundred are ever considered by the full House or Senate. After bills are introduced, they are sent to a committee, where the hard work of writing legislation is done. There are 20 committees in the House of Representatives and 16 committees in the

Senate, each with jurisdiction over a variety of bills, issues, agencies and

programs. Committees are the engines of Congress. Within their jurisdiction, they gather information, compare and evaluate legislative options, identify problems and propose solutions, and determine which bills to report to the full chamber for consideration. Most bills never make it out of Committee. As the state's congressional delegation changes, so does its participation in the various committees. With the retirement of U.S. Representative David Price, NC will no longer hold a seat on the powerful Appropriations Committee.

FY23 Mid-Year Progress Report



The Centralina team has been working diligently on the implementation of the FY23 workplan, which includes 62 tactics that support implementation of our strategic plan. Halfway through the fiscal year we have either started or completed 82% of our activities for the year. The remainder of the strategies are scheduled to begin next quarter.

The global crisis of the COVID-19 pandemic has drastically altered the landscape of daily life, including how we choose to travel. Since early 2020, public behaviors and mindsets around transportation have drastically transformed. CEDS Implementation Update

The Centralina Economic Development District (EDD) launched the 2023-2028 Comprehensive Economic Development Strategy (CEDS) Action Plan which serves as the region's roadmap for supporting a diverse economy that ensures coordinated growth via the prosperity for all CEDS Action Plan includes regional lenses. The 26 urgent recommendations implemented during the next 24 months being led by the 28 regional subject matter experts across the region. The Action Plan also includes 58 additional recommendations that will be implemented over the five-year CEDS time frame. The Action Plan includes a mid-point pulse check mechanism to evaluate how well the monitoring and evaluation of the CEDS goals is progressing and permits for a mid-term correction as a response.

Have you ever stopped to consider where you'll be at age 85? Centralina Area Agency on Aging (AAA) staff often ask this question in aging and disability sensitivity training encourage participants to think about the aging experience. population aging growing in the U.S. by 2040, about one in five Americans will be age 65. Centralina AAA, in an effort to help increase awareness of the challenges this demographic

will face, began offering aging and disability sensitivity training. These hands-on classes walk through several exercises designed to build understanding and in turn, improve customer service, when working with individuals who are older and/or living with disabilities. Centralina staff recently participated in this training exercise, wearing gloves to simulate the loss of dexterity in the hands and tinted glasses to represent vision loss and impairment. Using these props, staff then went through a series of ordinary, daily tasks including sorting medication by color, signing your name (using the opposite hand) and taking off and then putting back on an article of clothing like a shoe, watch or buttoned jacket.

Lake Norman Economic Development Targets Students to Grow Workforce

Lake Norman Economic Development (LNED) is a nonprofit focused on increasing economic outcomes in the community by addressing workforce gaps. In 2022, it received the 2021 Cross Community Collaboration Award (small community) for its Journey 360 program and virtual speed networking events that were developed to address workforce trends and provide high school students with educational opportunities. North Carolina Senior Tar Heel Legislature Celebrates 30 Years

Since its creation with the passage of Senate Bill 479 in July of 1993, the North Carolina Senior Tar Heel Legislature (NCSTHL) has served as a nonpartisan, unicameral body tasked by the NC General Assembly to identify the most pressing issues facing older adults across the state and propose new legislation that will improve their quality of life. The NCSTHL is comprised of delegates and alternates representing each of NC's 100 counties, supported by the Area Agencies on Aging serving the state's 16 service areas.
