Ideas in Action Project Updates

Project Updates: TDM

Regional Transportation Demand Management (TDM) Program

- Established TDM Steering Committee, meeting bi-monthly through FY24
- Conducting interviews with peer regions to **identify best practices**
- Performing data analysis to **identify TDM “hot spots”** in region – will ensure that all community types are represented
- Stakeholder engagement and outreach expected in fall



Project Updates: Seamless CONNECTIONS

- Identified **pilot projects** for regional transit coordination that CATS is incorporating into a **ConCPT grant** submission to NCDOT for funding
- In early June, CATS met with **regional transit operators and Remix** to discuss opportunities for using transit planning tool – will continue this work later this summer



Project Updates: Grants

USDOT Build America Bureau: Regional Infrastructure Accelerator Grant

- Funding for “accelerator” to **build regional capacity** and ready projects for federal funding
- Three main **service lines**:
 - Infrastructure Finance Innovation
 - Pipeline Project Facilitation
 - Transit-Oriented Develop (TOD) Innovation

EPA’s Climate and Pollution Reduction Grant

- Implementation funding will be made available **starting 1Q 2024**
- Steering Committee will include representatives from region’s MPOs/RPO
- **Grant deliverables** include:
 - Priority Climate Action Plan – March 1, 2024
 - Comprehensive Climate Action Plan – Summer 2025

Towards a Regional Governance Model

Important Context

Goal 1(b): determine feasible options for a regional governance approach

- 1. Reality:** NC has existing legislation governing RTA formation, governance and scope of responsibilities.
- 2. Responsibility:** Peer model research and discussion is a deliberative step towards achieving the committee goal.
- 3. Timing:** Available federal funding and governance models are parallel discussions.

Reality: Existing NC Legislation

Disclaimer: We are not evaluating merits of the legislation today. We will evaluate the legislation in parallel with identifying feasible options for a regional governance approach.

- Two NC statutes enable the formation of a regional transportation authority (*Used for Triangle and Triad regions*)
- Definition of the region and formation actors:
 - *§160A-Article 26: Formed by 3 contiguous counties*
 - *§160-Article 27: Formed by 4 largest cities within an MPO*

Reality: Existing NC Legislation

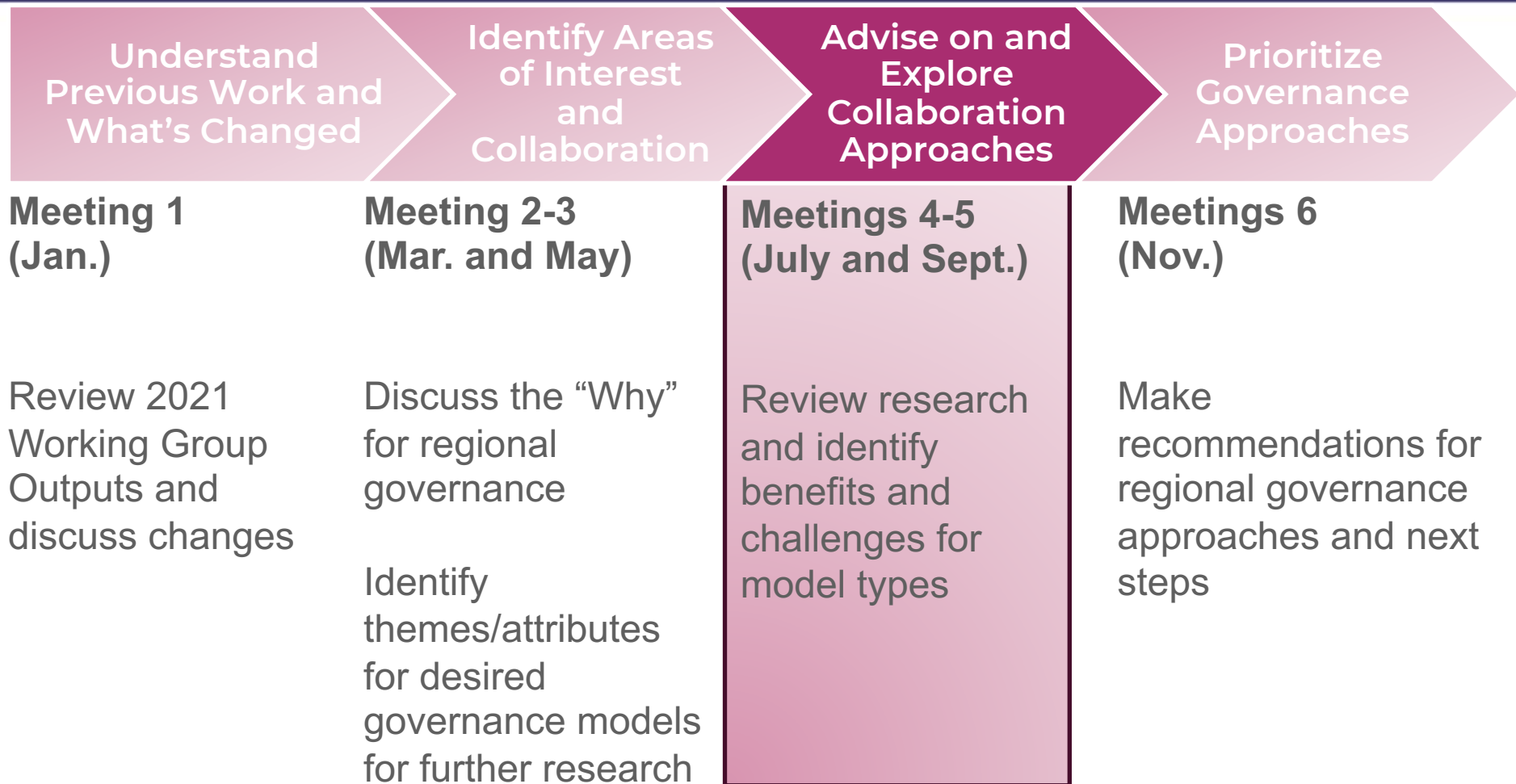
- Article 26 & 27 have **VERY specific parameters:**
 - Creation authority
 - Board membership and voting
 - General powers
 - Duties of specific officials
 - Fiscal scope: funds, bonds, available revenue sources and authorities
 - Reporting requirements to the General Assembly

Example: Existing NC Regional Transportation Authorities

- Authorized under:
 - NC Statute 160A, Article 26 (Triangle) and 27 (PART)
- Funding Sources available to both RTAs:
 - NC Statute 105, Article 50 (Vehicle Rental Tax)
 - NC Statute 105, Article 51 (Vehicle registration tax – not to exceed \$8/year)

Responsibility: Peer Research

Peer research discussion:

- Define the **building blocks** for an RTA in the shorter and longer term
- Today, looking for **lessons/insights** from peer regions
- Next meeting – come up with **options** based on the approaches we define today

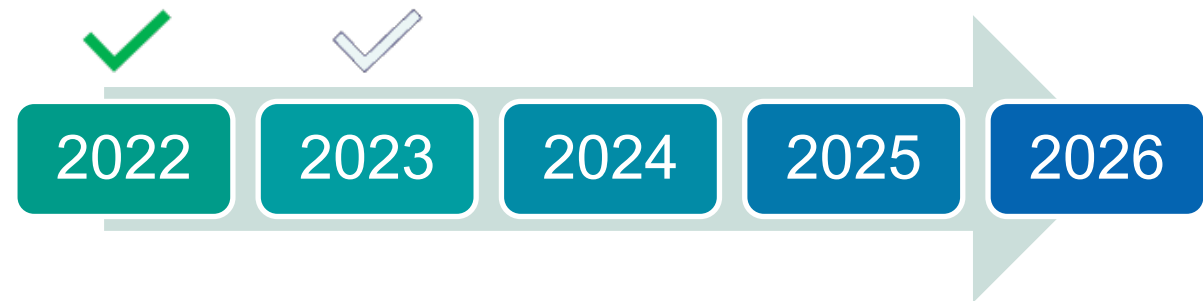


Timing: Federal Funding & Governance Models

Last meeting, we reviewed timing of IIJA funding

- Funding is **critical** to funding transportation projects in region
- Not necessarily tied to our region having a regional governance approach
- Need to pursue **in parallel** – put forward best projects

IIJA Implementation



Timing: IIJA Federal Funding Opportunities

- Majority of the public transportation funding opportunities are largely focused on **niche investments** vs. large capital funding streams – these do not require an RTA in place
 - Example: Centralina's RIA grant application
- The main capital improvement grant programs are focused on construction of fixed guideway systems. In our region, it's likely that **only the Silver Line** would meet criteria
- Match is required on these federal grants; however, even if an RTA with taxing authority or revenue raising authority is set up, it is unlikely to generate funds quickly enough for this match

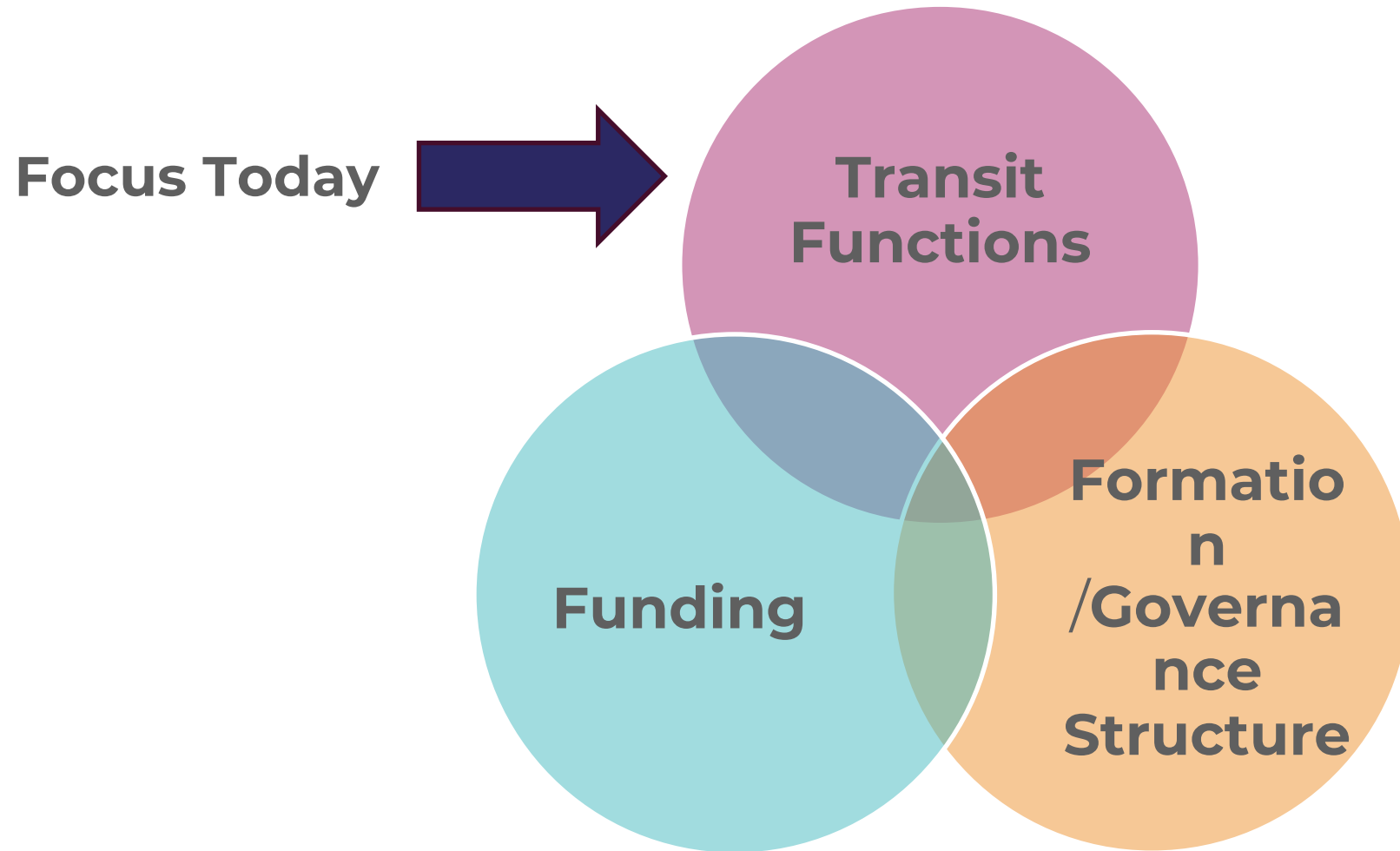
Our Guiding Principles

Our purpose for regional collaboration is to:

- Strengthen **Economic Competitiveness** of Our Region
- Increase **Investment**
- Increase **Local Input**
- Improve **Regional Service and Access**
- Improve **Operational Efficiencies**

Our preferred governance model should align/reflect these principles

Regional Model Building Blocks

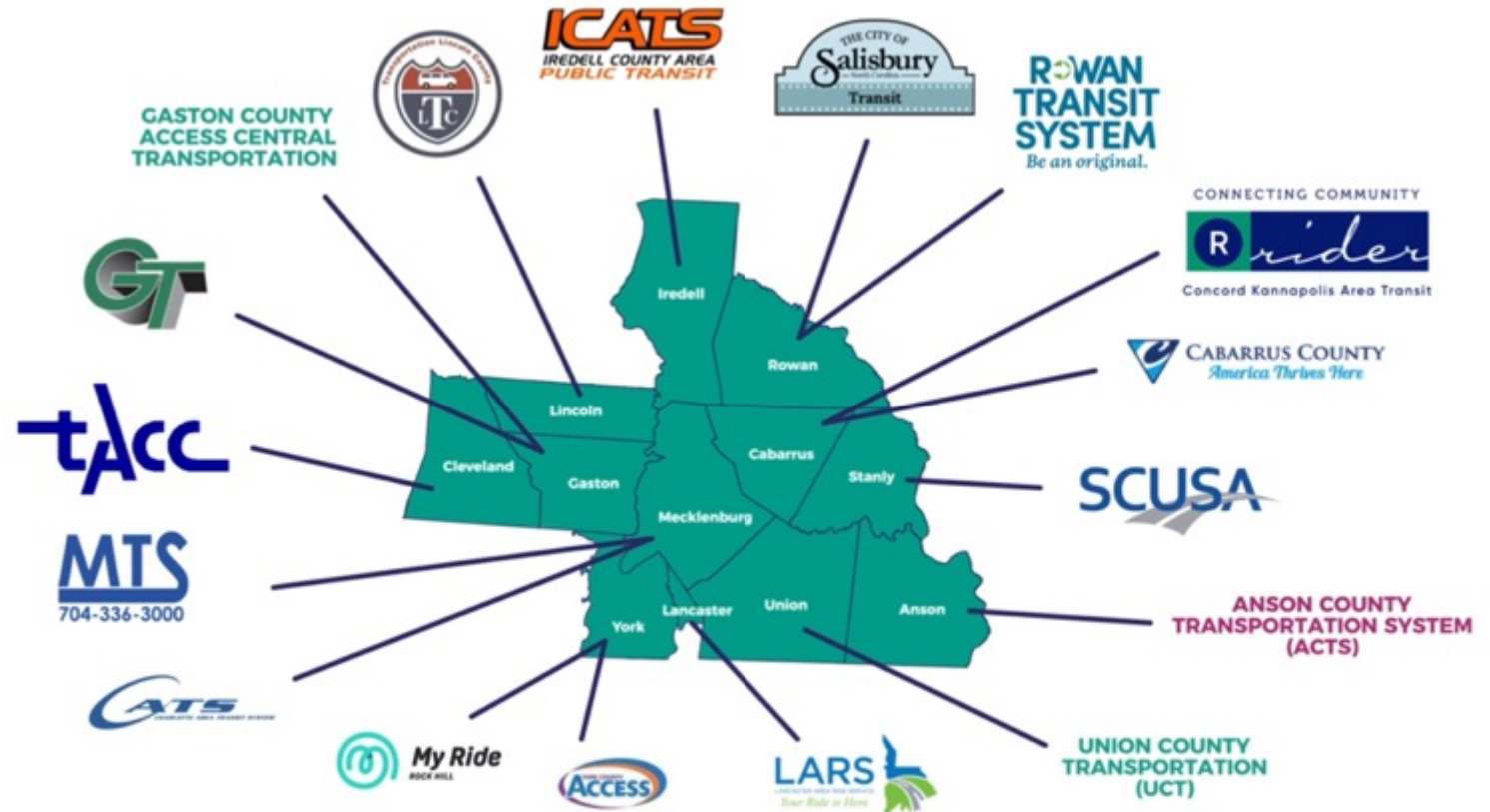


Transit Functions: What We Heard

- From last meeting:
 - All groups desired **regional marketing, communication**
 - Most groups wanted **some version** of a fully integrated transit agency
 - Half of the groups had a preference for **evolving** responsibilities over time based on success
 - Half of the groups had **concerns over loss of local autonomy** for operators/agencies, i.e. location of bus stops
- Outstanding questions: when/where does it make sense to share resources (i.e. facilities, assets, funding)

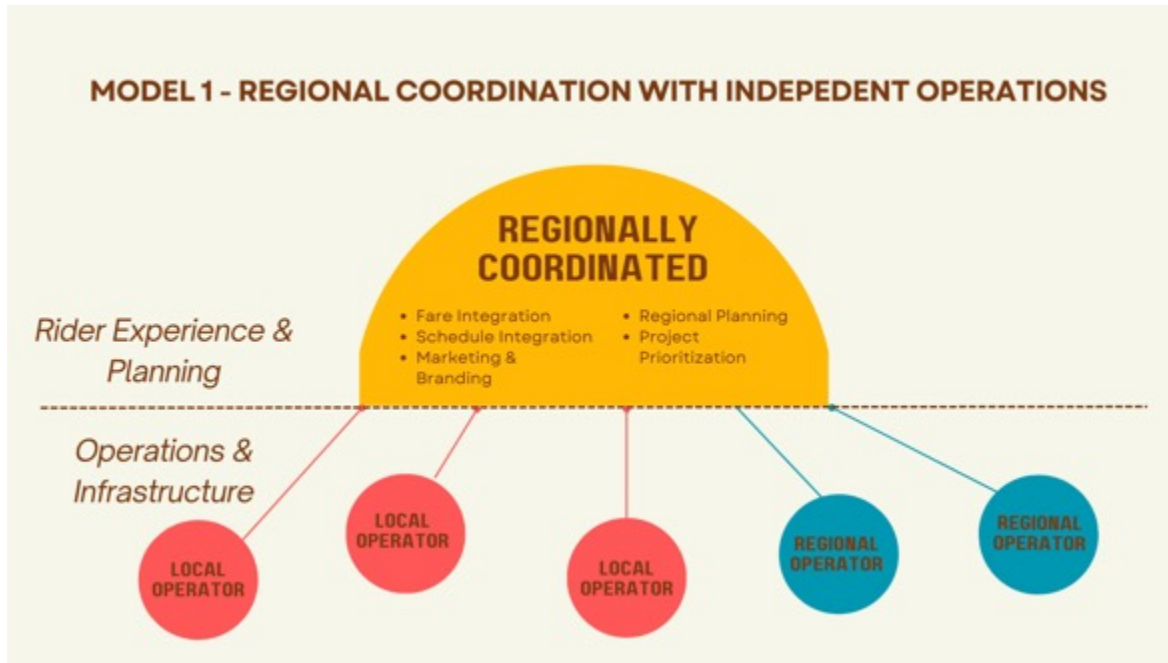
Current State: Transit Service in Our Region Involves Many Agencies

- 17 providers in CONNECT Beyond region:
 - 6 fixed route and 11 community transportation providers

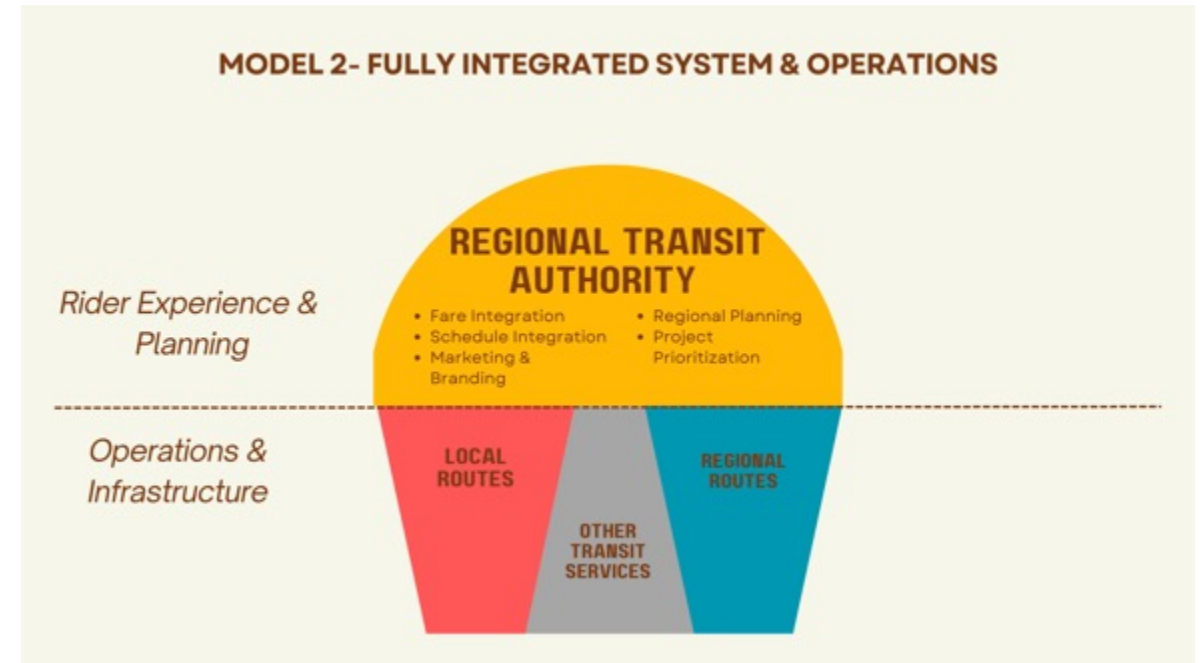


Peer Region Models

Generally, the peer regions fall into two categories of models:



Model 1 focuses on regional collaboration of **rider experience and planning** transit functions. *Includes Atlanta, Tampa and Nashville (partially).*



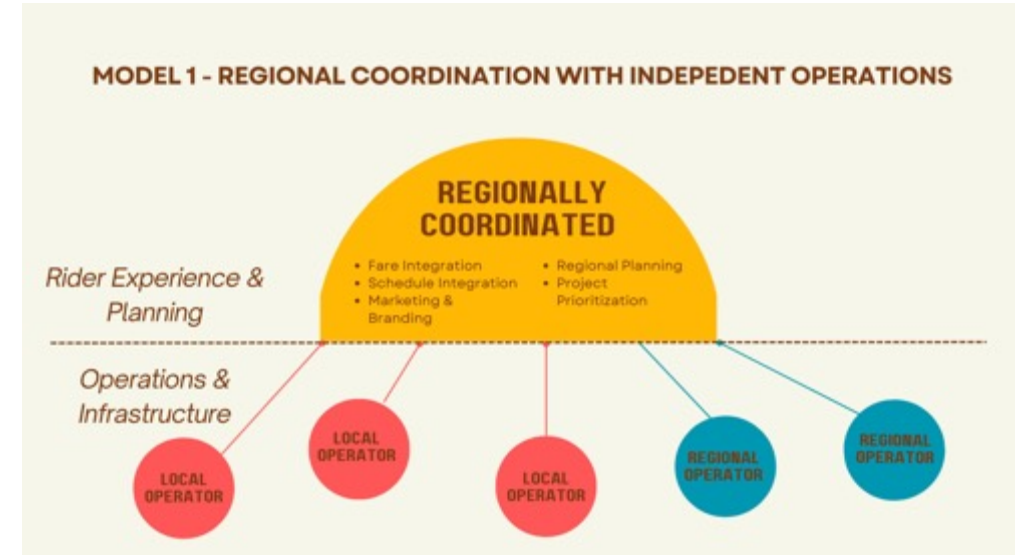
Model 2 represents a more **fully integrated model** with the regional entity delivering infrastructure and operations. *Includes Minneapolis, Phoenix and Seattle.*

Model 1 Example: Atlanta

Atlanta - ATL

Regional Collaboration is mainly focused on Rider Experience and Planning:

- **Shared marketing/branding** with local operators (ATL logo on vehicles)
- **Integrated fare** and scheduling across many operators who maintain autonomy
- Prioritized list of **regional projects** (recent RAISE grant award for listed project)
- Oversees vanpool and portion of commuter express buses



Peer Regions – Model 1 Transit Functions Discussion

MODEL 1 - REGIONAL COORDINATION WITH INDEPENDENT OPERATIONS

Increasing Complexity ↓

| Transit Function | Definition |
|-----------------------------------|--|
| Marketing/Communication Campaigns | Implementing regional marketing activities and communications strategy |
| Shared Branding | Ranges from unified branding to sharing a logo |
| Fare Integration | Allows user to buy a single fare and use across region |
| Scheduling Coordination | Coordination across system to improve user connections |
| Planning for Regional* Projects | Setting regional strategy/plan for regional bus/rail networks and infrastructure |
| Regional Project Prioritization | Identifying, screening and prioritizing regional initiatives consistent with regional strategy |

* Regional refers to projects that cross county lines

Model 2 Examples: Phoenix and Minneapolis

MODEL 2- FULLY INTEGRATED SYSTEM & OPERATIONS



Phoenix – Valley Metro

Regional Collaboration: Model 1 +

- Unified branding on all assets
- Regional planning, project prioritization and regional project infrastructure delivery
- Operates regional bus and rail; local operators provide local bus routes

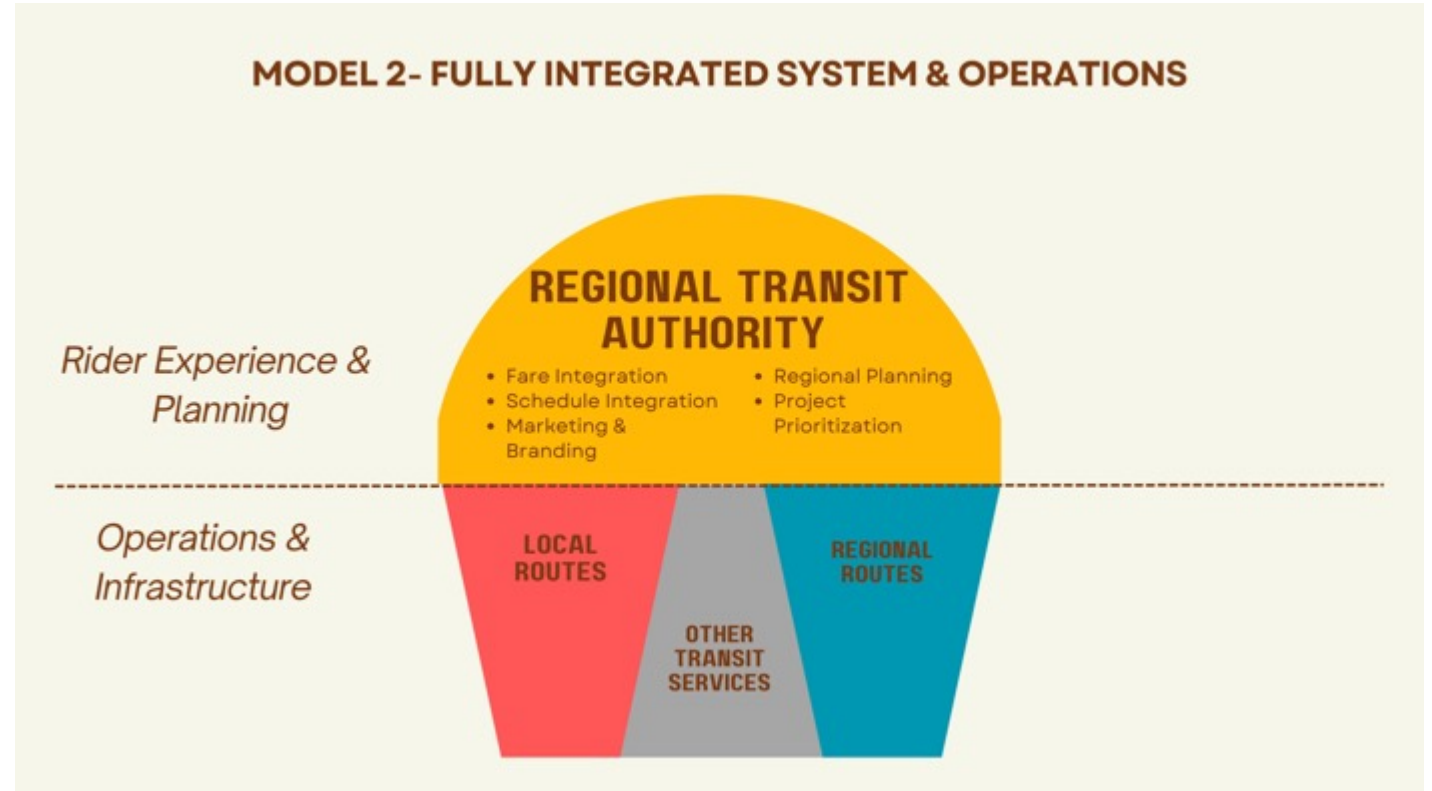
Minneapolis – Met Transit

- Operates and funds almost all regional and local routes

| Transit Function | Definition |
|--|---|
| Infrastructure: Regional* Project Design and Delivery | Responsibilities could include defining project scope/timing, design engineering and delivery readiness for regional projects (ex. Bus Rapid Transit) |
| Infrastructure: Local Project Design and Delivery | Same as above for local projects (ex. Mobility hub at Salisbury Train Depot) |
| Operations: Regional* Routes | Operations of regional routes (ex. 74X, 85X) |
| Operations: Local Routes | Operation of local routes (ex. CK Rider Yellow Route between Concord and Kannapolis) |

* Regional refers to projects that cross county lines

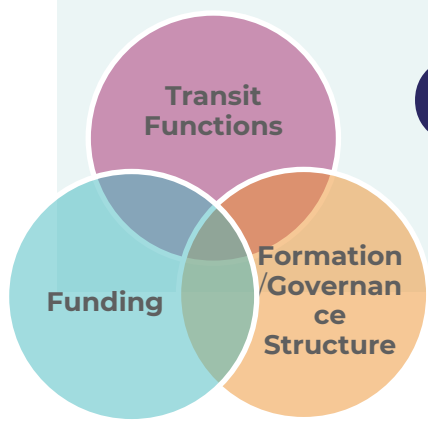
