Call to Order:

Mayor Lyles called the meeting to order and recognized that these Committee meetings are open meetings. Mayor Hinnant welcomed the Committee and recognized the work for the day:

<u>Committee Meeting Objectives:</u>

- **Highlight** early wins for CONNECT Beyond implementation
- Revisit and Revise the Committee's year-end goals for 2024
- **Identify** details of the preferred regional coordination model that need to be developed in 2024
- **Confirm** next steps for the Committee, including communication activities, roles, and responsibilities for 2024

Agenda Items:

1. Approval of December 15, 2023 Meeting Minutes

Motion (Mayor Knox), Second (Councilmember Stepp), and the Committee members approved the December 15, 2023 Advancing the Plan Committee meeting minutes.

2. CONNECT Beyond Project Update: Early Wins – CONNECT Beyond Implementation Jason Wager, Regional Planning Director and Project Manager for CONNECT Beyond, and Jason Lawrence, CATS, reviewed the latest CONNECT Beyond implementation activities. Projects highlights included the development of a regional Transportation Demand Management plan and program, as well as Seamless CONNECTions activities. For Seamless CONNECTions, Jason Lawrence shared an update on a grant CATS recently received from NCDOT (ConCPT) to work on greater transit coordination with regional providers on scheduling, transfers, and technology.

The Committee members from the areas of the Charlotte Regional Transportation Planning Organization and Gaston-Cleveland-Lincoln Metropolitan Planning Organization are invited to attend a Joint MPO meeting on February 29, 2024. This Joint meeting will focus on transportation funding. An RSVP link will be sent out after the meeting.

3. 2023 Committee Work and Revised Year-End Goals

Geraldine Gardner, Executive Director of Centralina, reviewed the work done by the Committee in 2023. She then shared proposed year-end goals for 2024 for the Committee to review and refine. Each goal includes success measures for the Committee to strive to achieve during the year. After some Committee discussion, the proposed goals were agreed to as follows:

- Refine the regional coordination model to strengthen broader support and incorporate local input
- Champion short-term wins for regional collaboration and support CONNECT Beyond implementation
- Advocate and collaborate with local state, federal, and business community partners to advance the next steps for regional coordination

4. Road Map to Developing the Preferred Model:

Michelle Nance, Deputy Executive Director of Centralina, reviewed the workplan for the Committee this spring to develop the details of the governance structure for the Regional Mobility Partnership Model. Michelle reviewed the benefits and functions of the model for the Committee and then focused on what details still need to be developed for the legislative authorization.

5. Engagement Strategy – Making the Case

Jason Wager outlined the components of engagement that the Communicate will need to participate in throughout 2024 to help build support and inform/improve the model for the region. Some of these engagement activities will need to be done in parallel

PART serves the Triad (Greensboro/Winston-Salem) metro area in North Carolina. Its history includes a path to a regional transit authority under NC General Statute 160 A, Article 27.

Eligible Geography

A regional transit authority formed under Article 27 has these attributes:

- (1) The area consists of all or part of five counties, all five counties of which form a contiguous territory.
- (2) At least two of those counties are contiguous to each other and each have a population of 250,000 or over; and
- (3) The other three counties each have a population of 100,000 or over. (1997-393, s. 1.)

This text creates a five-county minimum to form the authority.



Purpose and Services Provided

PART staff works on a variety of transportation related programs and services, some of which are likely to be Regional Mobility Partnership Model activities.

Potential Regional Mobility Partnership Model activities at PART

- Community Outreach and Education telling the public about travel options
- Commuter Resources & Transportation Demand Management (TDM) supporting carpool, vanpool, biking and walking for individuals/employees
- PARTnership Employer Services TDM targeted at employers

PART Board Composition and Membership

PART's 21-Member Board includes:

- A Commissioner from nine member counties (9 seats)
- Representatives of the Triad's four largest cities (Burlington, High Point, Greensboro, Winston-Salem) (4 seats)
 - o Yadkin and Rockingham have not activated local transit revenue
- Representatives of the Four Metropolitan Planning Organizations (4 seats)
- Representatives of the two regional airport authorities (2 seats)
- NCDOT Board of Transportation (2 seats)



Eligible Geography

A regional transit authority formed under Article 26 has these attributes:

- (1) The area consists of three counties: [a 3-county minimum & maximum]
- (2) At least one of those counties contains at least part of Research Triangle Park
- (3) The other two counties each:
 - a. Have one local transit agency that receives FTA funds
 - b. Are adjacent to a county that contains part of Research Triangle Park



Regional Transit Authority Legislation Framework

3/15/24

In reviewing the existing NC statutes which authorized the formation of PART and GoTriangle, we identified a **framework of key elements** for any authorization legislation of a regional transit authority (RTA). The first three elements (Eligible Geography, Purpose of Authority and Board Membership) will be discussed at the March 22nd Advancing the Plan Committee meeting. The fourth, Funding, will be discussed at the May meeting. Please review the summary below:

1. Eligible Geography

- What it is: Defines the eligible territory of the authority this is distinct from the service area of the authority.
- Options: Counties, municipalities, transportation planning organizations, regional councils, other regional definitions; Can add specifications about: population requirements, state identified districts and other restrictions.

2. Purposes and Services Provided

- o What it is: Defines the kinds of public transportation services the RTA will provide
- Options: Regional coordinated services focused on the user this is where the Committee's work last year defining the services of the Regional Mobility Partnership model will be incorporated. Some consideration may be given to broaden this list to accommodate for future potential services.

3. Board Composition and Membership

- What it is: Identifies the entity(ies) that need to take action to form the authority and defines the membership for the authority's Board. Also addresses the process of adding new members and its impact on the authority's service area.
- Options: Counties, municipalities, transportation planning organizations (MPOs and RPOs), regional councils, state officials, transit agencies

4. Funding

- What it is: Identifies sources of funding for the authority
- Options: Identifies any new or existing sources of funding that can be used by the authority; also identifies the authority as a recipient of federal and state grants

<u>Other Components of Legislation:</u> There will be other components of any potential RTA authorization legislation that will need to be addressed as we get into the drafting of language. These include, but are not limited to:

 Creation of a Special Tax Board to activate streams of revenue in accordance with legislation



- Defining of also Board member terms, officer elections, Board voting and Board members removal procedures
- Defining a prohibition of competition with private charter services
- Definition of the powers of the Authority, including owning property, issuing bonds, eminent domain, tax exemption and entering into contracts
- Definition of a method of terminating the Authority by the Board of Trustees
- Definition of taxes or fees that the Authority may levy to raise revenue
- Definition of limits of liability that the Authority may have, particularly pertaining to railroads



Committee Overview

What is CONNECT Beyond?

CONNECT Beyond is a **bold regional transit vision** and plan that provides **real mobility solutions** and opportunities for residents and visitors across the greater Charlotte region. The plan was adopted by its lead sponsors, Centralina Regional Council and Metropolitan Transportation Commission and all North Carolina transportation planning organizations in the region. Project efforts now are focused on implementing the plan's 120+ recommendations.

Advancing the Plan Committee

This committee, an official subcommittee of Centralina's Board, is dedicated to guiding the CONNECT Beyond plan in the Greater Charlotte region. Their role includes fostering regional discussions and actions and strengthening partnerships.

The Advancing the Plan Committee met throughout in 2023 and focused on:



Exploring short-term regional collaboration and developing a regional governance strategy.



Supporting and implement a regional communication **framework** for CONNECT Beyond.



Educating state lawmakers about CONNECT Beyond and push for regional funding initiatives.

Regional Mobility Partnership Model

A Regional Mobility Partnership Model was identified as the best approach for coordinating regional mobility, focusing on collaborative transit planning and enhanced rider experience, with local agencies overseeing daily operations and infrastructure.

- Members will engage their iurisdictions to develop support and seek local input on the model's approach.
- The Project Team will continue to brief the Centralina Board on the Committee's work and future plans.

Committee Work:

The Committee will be developing the governance structure and possible funding strategies for the partnership model.
